

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
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

A LESSON IN HISTORY

In the Bhagavata Purana it is said that Bhudevi asked Garuda to bring his favourite hill to earth so that she and Lord Varahadev could reside together on it. That hill later came to be known as Tirumala comprising of seven heads representing the seven heads of Adisesha and is considered a very holy place even to this day. The temples in Tirupati have various important inscriptions that belong to the Pallava, Chola, Pandya and Saluva dynasties.



KNOW YOUR CITY

According to ancient history, Lord Ram stayed in Tirupati with Sita and his brother Laxman after returning from Lanka. The city is known for its temples especially the Venkateshvara Temple which has many important inscriptions in Sanskrit, Tamil, Telugu and Kannada. The Tirumala Hill of Tirupati is considered a Holy abode of Lord Venkateshvara and until 1870, non-Hindus were not allowed to visit the hill.

Lake: This natural spring freshwater lake is famous as it is said that Lord Vishnu took a long bath with his wife Lakshmi Devi at this place. During the Brahmotsavam festival, devotees take a dip in this lake to cleanse themselves.

Silathoranam:

Known as an archaeological marvel, this arch is a National Geoheritage Monument and one of three natural arches to exist in the world. Silathoranam is well-connected by roads and tourists mostly visit it at sunset to admire its beauty.



TANTALISE YOUR TASTE

Tirupati Laddu: Made from flour, cashew nuts, cardamom, ghee, sugar and raisins. This famous sweet is only prepared in Tirupati and is served by devotees to Lord Venkateshvara at the Tirumala Venkateshvara Temple.




Andhra Thali: Includes rice, sambar, a curry dish, pickles, poriyal (a cauliflower stew) and kurma (a coconut milk and vegetable stew). These spicy yet delicious dishes capture the true essence of Andhra Pradesh and are a must-try when in Tirupati.



Pulihora: Made with cooked rice, tamarind extract and spices, this dish is usually cooked on special occasions and is presented to deities in temples as part of prayers.









Deer Park: The Tirumala Deer Park Reserve is located near the suburbs of Kandaleru city and is famous for the many escapades it offers into nature for the wildlife enthusiasts. Tourists can spot deer in their natural habitat and also interact with them.

Sri Venkateswara National Park: This place is not only a biosphere reserve but also home to various flora and fauna. Being spread over a vast area, the park is ideal for nature lovers looking to spot vascular plant species. The Oriental white-backed vulture which is an endangered bird is found in this national park.

Try to pack eco-friendly products or go completely plastic-free, by using shampoo bars, tooth tabs, deodorant bars, etc. These sustainable products use up less space and are allowed in your hand luggage. Plus, they are much better for the environment.

- Travel with local transport providers (where safe): From tuk tuks to tro tros, taking local transport over Uber or taxis is one of the quickest ways to explore and give directly to the drivers.
- · Book local tours: Booking tours of local areas is an efficient and educational way to get the most out of your sustainable vacation experience if you're limited on time.
- · Buy locally handmade curios: While we always encourage experiences over trinkets, finding truly unique pieces



made by local artisans is a wonderful way to help the local economy.

Offset Emissions



Taking Off: A Journey to the Skies

A skilled pilot, an experienced flight instructor and a proud grandfather—Captain Kuldeep Kalra, Director Flight Operations at Star Air, talks about how his curiosity led him to his career.

How did you become a pilot?

In the year 1982, on my daily commute to college, I often saw gliders flying and despite not knowing much about flying other than that it was an expensive hobby and career—I found that my curiosity got the better of me, and I treated myself to a joy ride on one.

I was hooked immediately and joined the gliding club the very next day and went on to get my glider pilot licence. This club soon began balloon flying so I went to train on those and proudly became the fifth person in all of India to attain a (flying) balloon licence. Logically, my next step was pursuing my Commercial Pilot Licence (CPL), which I did; flying a fixed-wing aircraft—the Pushpak, at the Patiala Flying Club.

As luck would have it, Indian
Airlines, which was one of the few
avenues for budding CPL holders
at the time, came out of a five-year
hiring hiatus with a vacancy and this
is where my career truly began.

Tell us about the recruitment process and your initial experience until the time you started flying a commercial jet.

It was a tough selection process. We had three rounds of tests and could be eliminated at any stage. The first round was a written exam. The second round consisted of psychometric tests which required us to complete 100 questions on mathematics, colours and speed in a span of 10 minutes. The third round was a group discussion round and the finalists then went on to the interview stage. Thankfully, I was able to impress the panellists; enough to secure a job.

My batch was the first batch to be sent directly to a jet aircraft—the Boeing 737. We were sent to the Indian Airlines in-house type-rating facility at Hyderabad where we did a very rigorous eight months of ground and classroom training followed by simulator sessions. The simulators at that time were not as advanced as they are today, as they were 2D simulators. After the simulator, we had to do 10 hours of training on the aircraft doing circuits and landings both day and night, at Hyderabad's Begumpet Airport.

This was followed by a day check and a night check on the aircraft. At the time, there were only two Boeing 737 examiners cleared to do these checks in India. One was the Director of Training and the other was the Director of Flight Operations. Out of my batch of 16 trainee first officers, only 13 managed to successfully clear training and checks to move on to flying.



After flying the Boeing 737 for three years, many of my batch mates including me moved to the Airbus A300—again a first in terms of new inductees moving onto a wide body. I flew the A300 for three years and came back to flying the 737 for two more years.

At this time, the aviation industry was opening up to privatization and in 1993 I moved on to Sahara India Airlines as their first pilot, progressing in my career there and becoming the youngest VP of Operations for an airline in the country until the airline's buyout by Jet Airways and rebranding into JetLite. A year later I moved on to Singapore as a Chief Pilot to fly for a private aircraft



operator flying the Boeing 737 BBJ. The company later acquired an Embraer Legacy 650. I was trained on that aircraft also and went on to fly both the airplanes for the company; at times flying both the airplanes on the same day under FAA rules. After spending half a decade with them, I was homesick and yearned to come home. Upon returning to India at the end of 2014, I had to redo my Airline Transport Pilot Licence (ATPL).

I went on to join a corporate house flying the Embraer Legacy 650 for a year and then moved on to Air Costa as the Director of Operations flying the Embraer E170s and E190s, then onto a private charter operator flying the Embraer Legacy again until the COVID-19 wave hit and I found myself working at Star Air as the Director of Flight Operations. Through my years, I have flown about 10 different jet aircraft in worldwide operations despite never being interested in long haul, international flights. To me, flying is actual, daily flying. I much prefer doing four landings in a day to four landings in a month. This is why despite living abroad and working in big airlines, I prefer domestic, smaller airlines that function almost like a family unit.

What are the challenges you have faced during the course of your career?

To say I have not experienced many challenges would be a lie. However, the most memorable instance of in-flight failure has to be when I experienced an engine failure at a very critical speed during take roll on a night flight from Kathmandu to Delhi, many years ago. While on the take-off roll, just before the decision

speed (V1), we had a combustion chamber burst. Quickly, we rejected take-off and managed to stop just a couple of feet short of the end of the runway. I distinctly remember getting off the aircraft and seeing the brakes glowing red from overheating. I suspect that had we decided to take-off that night, we would not have made it with iust one functioning engine and an aircraft full of passengers. The flight was then cancelled and when we reached the arrival hall in the terminal building, all the passengers were waiting for us and welcomed us by clapping and were thanking us. The sight is still as fresh in my mind as if it were yesterday.

Another incident that comes to mind is when I was flying with a fresh CPL holder, training him to become a co-pilot on 737 classic aircraft. We were travelling from Delhi to Guwahati on a foggy winter morning when we experienced a complete electrical failure. All systems and electronics turned off apart from my two instruments. Unfortunately, due to the fog, all stations that we could divert to were below minimas and we still had an hour and 15 minutes of flying time left before Guwahati. We decided to hand fly the aircraft, without autopilot or any systems to aid us and thankfully we landed at Guwahati without any problems.

I have also experienced about eight instances of engine failure, and many other system failures but because I became an Instructor, Examiner and later Director of Operations and Training quite early in my career, all of these instances became quite routine due to regularly teaching new pilots how to navigate similar

situations in the simulator.

Tell us about your family.

We are proud parents of two beautiful and independent girls. My older daughter is married and lives in Delhi with her family while my younger daughter lives and works in the UK. I travel there once a year to see her and she comes home about twice a year. I'm admittedly a very indulgent grandfather to a very naughty three-year-old girl who has me (and the rest of us!) wrapped around her finger. My wife tends to divide her time between Delhi and Bangalore, making trips to the UK every couple of months to see our younger daughter.

Describe your journey with Star Air.

Initially, Star Air for me was a shortterm solution as I didn't want to be away from Delhi for an extended period of time, but a few months into working with Star Air, I began to like the company. I discovered that the people were nice, and the atmosphere was great—it was like a family. I've always loved smaller companies for this very reason and Star Air turned out to be exactly what I was looking for at the time.










Network Map



Cherry-Berry Pancakes

Ingredients

- 350g flour
- · 2 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp ground cinnamon
- · 2 tsp caster sugar
- 150g buttermilk or plain yogurt
- · 325ml milk
- 200g blueberries
- 150g cherries
- 1tsp vanilla extract

Method

- Mix the flour, baking powder, cinnamon and sugar into a bowl, add a good pinch of salt and whisk to combine.
- Add the buttermilk or yoghurt and milk to the bowl and whisk into a smooth pancake batter.
- Mix the blueberries, cherries, corn flour, caster sugar and vanilla extract into a pan and stir until the berries are coated in corn flour.
- Add 1 tbsp water, then place over high heat until it becomes syrup but the berries are still holding their shape. Later, set aside to cool.
- Heat oil in a large, heavy frying pan and wipe it around the pan with a piece of kitchen paper, leaving a fine coating of oil on the surface.
- Transfer the pancake batter to a jug. Heat the pan and pour the batter into the pan, making small pancakes, with plenty of space between them.
- Cook each pancake until the underside is golden. When bubbles appear on the surface and the edges, the pancake is ready to be flipped over. They should take roughly two minutes on each side.
- Transfer the pancakes to a baking tray and leave them to cool down.
- Wipe a little more oil around the pan and continue cooking the rest of the batter in this way. You should get 12 pancakes.
- To serve, stack the pancakes with a dollop of mascarpone and fruits between each layer and serve with a generous amount of maple syrup.



Strawberry Fresh Cream Tart

Ingredients

For the crust:

- 2 tbsp cooking oil
- 2 tbsp cold whole milk 1 tsp apple cider vinegar
- 11/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/4 tsp baking powder
- 3 tbsp granulated sugar
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 6 tbsp cold unsalted butter, cut into 1/4-inch

- · 1tsp corn flour
- 200g mascarpone
- Maple syrup (to serve)

Method

For the crust:

- Whisk the milk, vinegar and oil in a bowl.
- Grind the flour, baking powder, sugar and salt in a mixer to combine; add the butter and mix until it looks like coarse meal; add the milk mixture and mix once or twice, just to moisten the flour.
- Pat the dough onto the bottom and up the sides of a 9-inch round tart pan with a removable bottom. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate until firm, at least 30 minutes. Trim the edges, if necessary.
- Preheat the oven to 350 °F. Pierce the dough all over with a fork, place on a baking sheet and bake 15 minutes until golden. Once done, transfer to a rack and let it cool down completely.

For the filling:

- Sprinkle the gelatin over the cold water in a bowl and let it soften for
- Put the granulated sugar and vanilla bean in a saucepan and rub together with your fingers.
- Whisk in the fresh cream over medium heat to dissolve the sugar. Bring to a boil, then remove from the heat and whisk in the gelatin mixture.
- Transfer to a bowl and set in a larger bowl of ice water; stir with a rubber spatula until thickened.

Final Step:


- Stir in the remaining 1/4 cup light cream and pour into the cooled tart shell to refrigerate for one hour until set.
- Before serving, top the tart with the strawberries and dust it with confectioner's sugar.*

1tsp water

- 1tsp unflavoured gelatin
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 vanilla bean
- 11/4 cups fresh cream
- 800g strawberries cut into 1/2 inch pieces
- Confectioner's sugar for dusting

Ragi Mudde

A well-known and typical Karnataka dish. It is prepared by cooking finger millet flour (ragi flour) with water to the consistency of thick dough. After that, the dough is formed into tiny spheres and served with a hot curry. It is nourishing and healthy and frequently given to those who are trying to lose weight or battle diabetes.



Bisi Bele Bath

A traditional rice-based dish from the South Indian state of Karnataka. 'Bisi' means hot, 'bele' means lentils, and 'bath' means rice dish. It is made with rice, lentils and vegetables. Bisi Bele Bath is a popular comfort food in Karnataka and is often served with raita, papad and a sweet dish.



A well-known dish prepared with refined wheat flour, ghee and sugar syrup that is sweet, crispy and flaky. The flavours of sugar syrup and cardamom give chirotis their sweetness, aromatic texture and crispy taste. It is a popular food during festivals and special occasions and is frequently provided as a dessert.



A kind of pancake that is the common breakfast in Karnataka. The Kannada word 'Neer' denotes water. It has a thin and supple structure and is made from a batter of rice and water. It is typically served with a veggie curry or coconut chutney and is both wholesome and delicious.

Mysore Pak

A well-known sweet delicacy from Karnataka, especially Mysore. It is a sweet dish prepared with gram flour (besan), ghee and sugar that is rich and decadent. Mysore Pak is a favourite gift during festivals and special events and is frequently given as a dessert.



Sagu, a popular dish in Karnataka, is starchy and grainy in texture. It is prepared by simmering a variety of veggies in a curry sauce made of coconut milk and spices and it is typically eaten with puri or rava idli. Sagu is the preferred meal during fasting because it is thought to be healthy and pure.



Haalba

A sweet delicacy that is indigenous to the state of Karnataka in southern India. It is prepared with coconut milk, jaggery and rice flour. Haalbai has a soft, fudgy texture and a sweet, nutty taste. It is a common dish provided at festivals and special events.
