



ir Commodore V D Eshwar was commissioned into the Indian Air Force as a fighter pilot in December 1982. He completed his masters from the prestigious 'Defence and Strategic Studies Air War College', Montgomery Alabama, USA. Only one officer from the Indian Air Force is selected to enrol in this college every year. He went on to do a tenure as a directing staff at the DSSC. For his exceptional service to the nation, he received recognition by the Chief of Air Staff and was awarded the Vishisht Seva Medal (VSM) by the then President of India, Dr. APJ Abdul Kalam.

He graduated as a Fighter Combat leader at TACDE (Tactical Air Combat Development Establishment), the Indian equivalent of the US Navy's TOP GUN. Only the top 1% of the Indian Air Force makes it to TACDE and he was one of them. Post graduation, he went on to become a TOP GUN instructor at TACDE and instructed experienced combat pilots in the art of air combat, tactical planning and warfare.

With over 33 years as a fighter pilot, Air Commodore Vellore Doraiswamy Eshwar VSM, Chief of Flight Safety at Star Air, is a decorated Officer of the Indian Air Force. During his tenure, he was appointed in Operations, Command and Training Establishments. Those days (talking about the old days of the Air Force, even before his time), a chap going on to the MiGs (21s), that is, around the time they first came to India, was more momentous than going to Space. Going supersonic was like being God.





He was fully operational on MiG-21 and MiG-29 and has flown multiple operational missions on these aircraft. He has more than 2,000 hours on the MiG-21 alone, which is about 6,500 missions/sorties. During his time in the IAF, he has flown the HT-2, HJT-16 Kiran, TS-11 Iskra, MiG-21, MiG-29 and Mi-8, Mi-17 helicopters. He is equally experienced on Drones, UAVs as with Fighters. However, his favourite aircraft remains the MiG-21 and he has flown almost all its variants right from the MiG-21FL to

MiG-21bis, his favourite variant being the bis.

During his tenure, Air Commodore Eshwar commanded operational units of the Indian Air Force. During his time, he actively participated in 'Operation Brasstacks' in the northern region, that took place from November 1986 to January 1987 near Pakistan border. He remained at the location for more than a year fully prepared during Operation Parakram in 2001-2002.

I have been with Star Air ever since the first flight in January 2019. When I joined, I did not have much experience in Civil Aviation. This is a completely different world and I have learnt a lot and I am still on the learning trajectory. I have seen the company grow from 1 aircraft to 8 and I feel very proud to have been a part of this journey and will continue to see the Airline soar to greater heights!



The MiG-21s require a lot of skill to fly.

There is a lot of 'pure flying' that is done on a Mig-21 as opposed to, say, a MiG-29 which is more about managing onboard systems. It's an absolute joy to fly, and in the right hands, she'll more than fulfil any mission requirement.

Vishisht Seva Medal Citation

Wing Commander Vellore Doraiswamy Eshwar (16994) Flying (Pilot) was commissioned in the Flying Branch of the IAF on 29 Dec 1982. He is a MiG-21 and MiG-29 pilot. The officer is a Fighter Combat Leader who has been the Deputy Commandant at Tactics and Air Combat Development and Training Establishment (TACDE). He is also an alumnus of Defence Services Staff College. Presently, he is the Commanding Officer of a missile Sqn since 29 Mar 2002. Wg Cdr Eshwar assumed command of Missile Sqn, whilst the Sqn was deployed for 'Op Parakram'. In spite of the trying circumstances of an active operational deployment, in a very short span of time, Wg Cdr Eshwar built up his professional knowledge and understanding of a complex system to his customary high standards. Notwithstanding the fact that the Sqn was deployed at two op locations, geographically separated by over 2000 km, he ensured that the op capability of the Sqn was maintained with 100% serviceability for the entire period of 'Op Parakram'.


During deployment, certain urgent modifications had to be carried out on the system to ensure operational efficiency. The military necessity of 'Op Parakram' demanded that these be carried out in field conditions. Despite the misgivings of the manufacturers, the officer accepted the responsibility and planned on site modifications at both Op locations in a phased manner, wherein the combat readiness of the Sqn was never compromised. He also ensured cross training of the available manpower towards multiskilling/tasking. Through involvement and initiative of the officer, the unit converted two common user trucks for mounting refuelling modules and operationalised them in a short span. Using his exceptional management skills, he has also been able to save on system inventory spares, computer peripherals, specialist tools, spare engine propellers etc to the tune of \$100,000.


For exceptional overall performance during the period, the Sqn was adjudged as the best missile Sqn of Central Air Command for 2002–03, which is an acknowledgement of the officer's deep involvement.

For his professional acumen and distinguished service of high order, the Hon'ble President is pleased to award 'Vishisht Seva Medal' to Wing Commander Vellore Doraiswamy Eshwar.

A totem is an emblem that represents a group of people. It may be a natural object, animal, bird, vegetable or fruit or even a place such as a village, town or city that is believed by a society to have significance, spiritual or non-spiritual, to it and is adopted by it as its emblem. A totem may also be a person or a thing regarded as being symbolic or representative of a particular personal attribute such as honesty.

How did totems originate?

The origins of totems go back to primitive times. Totems probably initially emerged as protectors of an individual or clan. A totem was thus regarded as an emblem that an individual or clan reposed faith in as a guardian or guardian-spirit in the face of the unknown. They could also be elements that were regarded as powerful or sacred. Initially elements of nature such as a mountain or forest or animal offered themselves as totems.

Over time, other elements with natural, social, ritual, mythological and religious attributes came to be regarded as totems, as an emblem to identify and bonds members of a clan. Thus a variety of beings, elements and objects came to be regarded as totems. The emergence of different totems has been governed by culture. Totems are a living heritage that links people to their ancestors going back centuries or even millennia.

What role do totems play?


The world over, totems have contributed to maintain social identity and integrity of clans. As a group of people share a totem over generations, it thus links them to their ancestry and past, and bonds members of the present generation with each other.

Totems have varied roles in different societies. For instance, anthropologically, a family's clan associates its origins to a totem so it gives a clan an identity and kinship amongst its members. Thus, each group is distinguished from another by its specific totem. It is surmised that over time, totems led to the emergence of clans and norms governing individual clans. For instance, the concept of endogamy - whereby members of a tribe or sub-tribe, caste or sub-caste with the same totem typically do not intermarry -emerged from the development of clans. Or there may be the presence of ethnocentrism that says the culture of my clan is the best.

Could you give us a few examples different types of totems?

Totems span a variety of elements namely fruits, roots, vegetables, plants, birds, animals, musical instruments, bodily parts, liquids, occupations, colours, cosmic bodies, places, and five great elements that is water, earth, mountain, fire and sky. Clans

have derived their names from them. Instances of totems and their corresponding clan names are mango and Ambekar, brinjal and vangad, root and Root, horses and Ghode, Kolhapur (a city) and Kolhapure, rope and Sutale, sarangi (musical instrument) and Sarangi, head and Doke, scent and Akhtar, carpenter and Sutar, peacock and More, star and Tare, red and Lal, sun and Sooryavanshi respectively. Over time, a person or a group of people have adopted new totems, as individuals or as a group with a shared interest. In this way, the number and range of totems increases over time.

Do beliefs in totems continue to

Yes, beliefs in totems exist even today. For instance in the Madia community

that lives in Madhya Pradesh, the groom carves a mundha that is a wedding pillar for the bride. This is placed in front of the bride's home or if she is living in a ghotul or dormitory, it is placed in front of that. Groups that regard a particular tree, bird or animal as their totem, will not harm it. This has played a role in preserving these species.

Can totems that are physical handmade objects be displayed as art in homes?

Handmade totems are artistically carved and often attractive to urban dwellers who regard them as a works of craft or art. For instance, totems such as hand-carved wedding pillars are seen for sale by members of the Pardi tribe in market places. If totems are purchased and placed in homes that are not connected with the clan that identifies with it, they are removed from their context. In such cases, totems could be displayed in a home only if they are placed and treated

KNOW YOUR CITY



Priced at ₹24.79 lakh for the base variant, the Invicto comes equipped with 2.0L engine and e-CVT transmission and is offered in 3 variants, 7-seater Alpha Plus and 7 and 8-Seater Zeta Plus.

Triumph Speed 400

panning 10 days,
Ganesh Chaturthi one

honours the birth of Lord
Ganesha, the benevolent

deity also known as the god

History of the Festival

It is believed that Lord Shiva's wife, Goddess Parvati. created Lord Ganesha out of clay and breathed life into him. She then appointed him as the guardian of her abode while she bathed. Lord Ganesha's staunch loyalty to his mother put him in conflict with Lord Shiva, leading to a fierce battle. Eventually, Ganesha's dedication and courage won the hearts of all the gods, and he was granted the title of 'Pratham Pujya' or the first to be worshipped before any other deity.

Ganesh Chaturthi across India

Ganesh Chaturthi is celebrated in various regions across India, albeit with different regional customs and traditions.

Goa: Beautifully decorated idols grace many homes and temples.

Gujarat: Elaborately crafted idols can be seen in cities like Vadodara. Ahmedabad. and Surat.

Tamil Nadu: Vinayagar Chaturthi is celebrated with great enthusiasm, particularly in the city of Chennai.

Andhra Pradesh: Temples dedicated to Lord Ganesha host special prayers and rituals.

How is it celebrated?

Ganesh Chaturthi sets off with the installation of elaborately crafted idols of Lord Ganesha in homes and public pandals. The idols are adorned with vibrant decorations and placed on ornate pedestals.

Throughout the ten-day festivities, the air echoes with the enchanting sound of bhajans, hymns, and the rhythmic beats of drums and cymbals. People from all walks of life come together, breaking barriers of caste and creed, to seek Lord Ganesha's blessings and guidance.

On the eleventh day, the festival reaches its crescendo with the immersion ceremony, known as 'Visarjan'. With great fervour and jubilation, the idols are carried through the streets in a grand procession, accompanied by dancing and singing devotees. As the idols are immersed in nearby rivers, lakes, or the sea, a sense of bittersweet emotion pervades the atmosphere.

Festival Food

Ganesh Chaturthi is not just a spiritual event but also a gastronomic delight. The festival is synonymous with an array of delectable treats prepared with utmost devotion and love:

Modak: A sweet dumpling stuffed with coconut, jaggery, and dried fruits, it holds a special place in the hearts of devotees and is considered Lord Ganesha's favourite food.

Nevri: A delectable Indian sweet, Nevri enchants taste buds with its flaky crust and luscious coconut filling.

Puran Poli: A thin, soft bread envelops a mixture of sweet lentils, jaggery, and spices, leaving a lingering warmth on the palate.

Laddoos: Glistening with ghee, they are prepared from an enticing medley of roasted nuts, cardamom, desiccated coconut, and jaggery with a base of gram flour or semolina.

Some communities also prepare savoury dishes to offer to Lord Ganesha on this auspicious occasion, including *alu vadi* or *patarveliya*, *chana sundal* and *sabudana khichdi.*


